Trunk or Treat is held on October 31st and is a fun filled event for all students at our school, their parents, and members of the community. Weeks prior to the event, students begin to bring in a plethora of candy donations in preparation for the "trick or treating" that evening. As the event approaches, contact is also made with civil service members (police and fire departments) so that they can also be present on the day of the event. Usually they showcase their police cars and fire rescue truck so that the students can enjoy them. Additionally, October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month and one of the police departments also provides their "pink" police vehicle; therefore, bringing out additional awareness in honor of Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

The evening begins with parents, who have volunteered, bringing in their vehicles into the school's parking lot. Students and parents collaborate in decorating their car's trunk in preparation for children then "trick or treating" as they visit each family's car trunk. This school year, a new twist was added to the program. Student Council from the middle school volunteered their time for an added portion of the event this year. They decorated and created a "spooky" hall way in the school's building (close to the main event). The middle school volunteers were costumes and assisted parents and children as they entered one end of the hallway and exited the opposite end. As they passed through the hallway, they experienced a little "spooky" fun.

The unique part of this program is that it provides a safe and secure area where the students, families, and members of the community can interact and have fun throughout the evening. Today, unfortunately, it is no longer as safe as it once was to knock on doors and "trick or treat" on Halloween. Therefore, by having this special event, families are able to partake with their children and staff members all evening long!
